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



# The Life Sentences of Rik McWhinney

# Rik McWhinney

edited with an introduction by Jason Demers

Through poetry, letters, essays, and interviews, The Life Sentences of Rik McWhinney relates the harrowing experiences of a man who spent nearly thirty-five years in the Canadian prison system.

ik McWhinney spent thirty-four years and four months in Canada's federal penitentiaries—sixteen of those in solitary confinement. His incarceration began in the 1970s, as a system-wide war was raging over the implementation of penal reforms. Though he was physically confrontational during the early years of his imprisonment, resulting in his segregation and medical torture, McWhinney eventually turned to writing to combat the conditions of his confinement.

The Life Sentences of Rik McWhinney collects his poetry, essays, grievance forms, letters, and interviews to provide readers with insight into the everyday life of incarcerated individuals, amplifying the lives and voices of a demographic that society would rather ignore. McWhinney relays the horrors of solitary confinement and provides a vivid account of the violence and psychological turmoil that he endured while incarcerated.

Ultimately, McWhinney's words are an indictment of the prison system, a system that institutionalizes individuals, subjecting them to an environment that manufactures post-traumatic stress rather than fulfilling its mission of rehabilitation and reform.



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



Opimōtēwina wīna kapagamawāt Wītigōwa / Journeys of The One to Strike the Wetigo contains interviews with elders, stories, personal photographs, and poetry, along with some original Swampy Cree translations.

Creating a vivid portrait of what it was like to live off the land in the past, Carriere also reveals how commercial fishing and hunting, hydro-electric dams, and other Western endeavours have impacted the livelihoods of so many Northern communities.

Born and raised in Cumberland House, Saskatchewan, **KEN CARRIERE** earned his Bachelor of Science degree in 1974 from Concordia University and his Bachelor of Education degree in 1984 from University of Saskatchewan while enrolled in the Northern Teacher Education Program at La Ronge, Saskatchewan. Carriere is a fluent speaker of the Swampy Cree dialect and a member of the Peter Ballantyne Cree Nation. He currently resides in the northern Saskatchewan village of Air Ronge.

A retired fisherman and trapper who sometimes lived rough on the streets, Augie Merasty was one of an estimated 150,000 First Nations, Inuit, and Métis children who were taken from their families and sent to government-funded, church-run schools, where they were subjected to a policy of aggressive assimilation.

As Merasty recounts, these schools did more than attempt to mould children in the ways of white society. They were taught to be ashamed of their heritage and, as he experienced, often suffered physical and sexual abuse.

A courageous and intimate memoir, *The Education of Augie Merasty* is the story of a child who faced the dark heart of humanity, let loose by the cruel policies of a bigoted nation. But even as he looks back on this painful part of his childhood, Merasty's sense of humour and warm voice shine through.






# The Boy from Buzwah A Life in Indian Education by Cecil King


# **Unsettled**

As a descendant of Canadian settlers and a scholar of sub-Saharan African, Maghrebi, and Amazigh cinemas, Petty believes strongly that working in cultural contexts different from one's own necessitates the development of respectful listening skills and openness to new experiences that are critical if one is to listen to, and understand, the goals and cultural and representational sovereignty of such artworks and artists. Using this frame of ethical engagement, she has written extensively on issues of cultural representation, identity, and nation in African and African diasporic screen media, and has curated film, television, and digital media exhibitions for galleries across Canada.




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


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
