



# PUBLISHER'S LETTER

he year 2023 marks a momentous milestone in the publishing history of URP: the 10th anniversary of University of Regina Press and the 50th anniversary of the Press's predecessor, the Canadian Plains Research Centre Press.

We have achieved a lot in our first ten years: we've published eight national bestsellers, including James Daschuk's Clearing the Plains—the best-selling scholarly book in Canada—and our authors have received numerous accolades, from coverage in the New York Times and The Guardian, to award recognition, including the Governor General's Award, Clio Awards, Indigenous Voices Awards, Gourmand World Cookbook Awards, and the Raymond Souster Poetry Award.

Situated on Treaty 4 territory, URP begins its next decade most appropriately by publishing two legendary masters of one of the oldest storytelling traditions of these lands: Plains Cree writer, Edward Ahenakew (1885–1961), and Woods Cree writer. Solomon Ratt.

Marking 100 years since its writing, Reverend Canon Edward Ahenakew's classic Old Keyam and his never-before published Black Hawk are brought together in a forthcoming multivolume set of the Collected Works of Edward Ahenakew. Buried in the archives and brought forward by his great-niece, Heather Hodgson, the semi-autobiographical Black Hawk appears in print for the first time, taking its deserved and honoured place in history as the first novel, according to

scholars, written by an Indigenous author in this country.

Continuing in the tradition begun by Ahenakew, Solomon Ratt (*The Way I Remember*) reflects on the forces that shaped his remarkable life from growing up traditionally on the land to the realities of forced assimilation at residential school, to thriving as a contemporary storyteller and vital activist, like Ahenakew, ensuring the survival and transmission of Cree language and culture.

We look forward to celebrating our tenth and fiftieth anniversaries with you. With the support of you—our readers, authors, and communities—URP will strive to continue its strong tradition of publishing ground-breaking books that matter for decades to come.



A residential school survivor finds his way back to his language and culture through his family's traditional stories.

hen reflecting on forces that have shaped his life, Solomon Ratt says his education was interrupted by his schooling. Torn from his family at the age of six, Ratt was placed into the residential school system—far from the love and comfort of home and family. In *The Way I Remember*, Ratt reflects on these memories and the life-long challenges he endured through his telling of autobiographical stories and traditional tales.

In many ways, these stories reflect the experience of thousands of other Indigenous children across Canada, but Ratt's stories also stand apart in a significant way: despite the destruction wrought by colonialism, he managed to retain his mother language of Cree by returning home to his parents each summer.


Ratt then shifts from the *âcimisowina* (personal, autobiographical stories) to *âcathôhkîwina* (sacred stories), the more formal and commonly recognized style of traditional Cree literature, to illustrate how, in a world uninterrupted by colonialism and its agenda of genocide, these traditional stories would have formed the winter curriculum of a Cree child's education.

Presented in Cree th-dialect standard roman orthography, syllabics, and English, Ratt's particularly Cree sense of humour shines, making kâ-pî-isi-kiskisiyân / أَحُ لَمُ كُمْ الْمُ الْمُحْدِينِ / The Way I Remember an important and unique memoir that emphasizes and celebrates Solomon Ratt's perseverance and life after residential school.



# The Life and Times of Augustine Tataneuck

An Inuk Hero in Rupert's Land, 1800-1834

by Renee Fossett

One of the few biographies of an Inuk man from the 19th century—separated from his family, community, and language—finding his place in history.

ugustine Tataneuck was an Inuk man born near the beginning of the 19th century on the northwestern coast of Hudson Bay. Between 1812 and 1834, his family sent him to Churchill, Manitoba, to live and work among strangers, where he could escape the harsh Arctic climate and earn a living in the burgeoning fur trade. He was perhaps the first Inuk man employed by the Hudson's Bay Company as a labourer, and he also worked as an interpreter on John Franklin's two overland expeditions in search of the Northwest Passage.

Tataneuck's life was shaped by the inescapable, harsh environments he lived within, and he was an important, but not widely recognized, player in the struggle for the possession of northwest North America waged by Britain, Russia, and the United States. He left no diaries or letters.

Using the Hudson's Bay Company's journals and historical archives, historian Renee Fossett has pieced together a compelling biography of Augustine and the historical times he lived through: climate disasters, lethal disease episodes, and political upheavals on an international scale.

While *The Life and Times of Augustine Tataneuck* is a captivating portrait of an Inuk man who lived an extraordinary life, it also is an arresting, unique glimpse into the North as it was in the 19th century and into the lives of trappers, translators, and labourers who are seldom written about and often absent in the historical record.

**RENEE FOSSETT** has a PhD in history from the University of Manitoba and was a Harington Fellow at the Centre for Rupert's Land Studies at the University of Winnipeg. She lived in the Arctic for ten years as a community teacher.

# **Old Keyam and Black Hawk**

The Collected Works of Edward Ahenakew (vol. 1)

In a monumental moment in literary history, the Collected Works of Edward Ahenakew (vol. 1) brings together two semi-autobiographical stories, *Old Keyam* and the never-before-published *Black Hawk*.


ritten during the early twentieth century, *Old Keyam* and *Black Hawk* are semi-autobiographical stories told in the charming, insightful voice of Edward Ahenakew. Through the fictional character Old Keyam, Ahenakew protests against the colonial settler's attempts to force the Cree peoples into "civilization." Despite the pained and angry voice of Old Keyam, the story is also at once humorous and satirical.

Following Old Keyam is the never-before-published Black Hawk. It tells the story of a young Cree man who, despite being a Christian, experiences discrimination as he navigates the changing society in Canada at the start of the 20th century, including the pass system and boarding school (residential school). Readers will discover a beautiful, charming love story as Black Hawk navigates the joy and pain of a budding romance.

DR. CANON EDWARD AHENAKEW (1885–1961) was a Cree Anglican minister, writer, storyteller, and preserver of the Cree language. Born on the Sandy Lake Indian Reserve (now the Ahtahkakoop Cree Nation) to Baptiste Ahenakew and Ellen Ermineskin, his contribution to Cree literature is foundational and widely respected. Best known for the "Cree Trickster Tales" and *Voices of the Plains Cree*, Ahenakew was the author of *Black Hawk*, believed to be the first novel written by an Indigenous author in Canada.

While growing up, **HEATHER HODGSON** (of Cree ancestry on her mother's side) heard many stories about her great-uncle Edward Ahenakew from her late mother and extended Ahenakew and Pratt families. She is the editor of *Seventh Generation: Contemporary Native Writing, The Great Gift of Tears*, and *Saskatchewan Writers: Lives Past and Present*. She currently resides in Regina, Saskatchewan.

# Who Gets In

An Immigration Story

by Norman Ravvin

An eye-opening account of the Jewish immigration experience in the 1930s, and one man's battle against anti-Semitic immigration policies.

n 1930, a young Jewish man, Yehuda Yosef Eisenstein, arrived in Canada from Poland to escape persecution and the rise of Nazism in the hopes of starting a new life for himself and his family. Like countless others who made this journey from "non-preferred" countries, Eisenstein was only granted entry because he claimed to be single, starting his new life with a lie. He trusted that his wife and children would be able to follow after he had gained legal entry and found work. For years, he was given two choices: remain in North America alone, or return home to Poland to be with his family.


Born from years of archival research, *Who Gets In* is author Norman Ravvin's deeply personal family memoir, telling the story of his grandfather's resolute struggle against xenophobic and anti-Semitic government policies. Ravvin also provides a shocking exposé of the true character of nation-building in Canada and directly challenges its reputation as a benevolent, tolerant, and multicultural country.


e Are the Stars is a literary recovery project that seeks to reconstruct a genealogy of Oceti Sakowin (Dakota) literature, and study in-depth the linkages between settler colonialism, literature, nationalism, and gender via analysis of tribal and settler colonial narratives about women and land.

Sarah Hernandez begins by exploring how settler colonizers used the printing press and boarding schools to displace Oceti Sakowin women as traditional culture keepers and bearers, with the goal of assimilating completely the Dakota, Nakota, and Lakota nations.

She then shifts her focus to decolonization, exploring how contemporary Oceti Sakowin writers and scholars have started to reclaim Dakota, Nakota, and Lakota literatures to decolonize and heal their families, communities, and nations.

**SARAH HERNANDEZ** (Sicangu Lakota) is an assistant professor at the University of New Mexico. Her research focuses on Indigenous literature and literary criticism. Hernandez is the Legacy and Literature Officer for the Oak Lake Writers Society, a first of-its-kind tribal writing group for Dakota, Nakota, and Lakota writers. She has collaborated with the Society to launch #NativeReads, a community-based reading campaign and podcast series to increase knowledge and appreciation of the Oceti Sakowin literary tradition.

ublishing works from emerging and established scholars, the Indigenous Voices in World Arts and Cultural Expressions series aims to showcase practices and critical discourses of diverse traditions of Indigenous makers that demonstrate intersections between Indigenous languages and Indigenous ways of knowing.

The books in this series will probe how visual cultural production from various parts of the world reflect Indigenous stories and concerns, local and global issues, how they are understood by Indigenous, international, and diasporic audiences, and how they exist within discourses of art histories, film histories, and visual culture.

# **SERIES CO-EDITORS:**

CARMEN ROBERTSON, Scottish-Lakota scholar from Saskatchewan, holds the Tier I Canada Research Chair in North American Indigenous Art and Material Culture at Carleton University. Her areas of research include Indigenous art histories, Indigenous cultural representations, and questions of decolonization. She is the principal investigator for the Morrisseau Project: 1955–1985, a co-investigator for the Unsettling and Indigenizing Cluster in the Thinking Through the Museum partnership research project, and is part of the Aunties Collective of Indigenous artists and scholars working to situate the aesthetics of Indigenous beading on the prairies within a discourse of Indigenous ways of knowing.


SHEILA PETTY is Professor of Media Studies at the University of Regina and a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada. As a descendant of Canadian settlers and a scholar of sub-Saharan African, Maghrebi, and Amazigh cinemas, Petty believes strongly that working in cultural contexts different from one's own necessitates the development of respectful listening skills and openness to new experiences that are critical if one is to listen to, and understand, the goals and cultural and representational sovereignty of such artworks and artists. Using this frame of ethical engagement, she has written extensively on issues of cultural representation, identity, and nation in African and African diasporic screen media, and has curated film, television, and digital media exhibitions for galleries across Canada.





